Clubs' statewide bid fails; Soccer supremos opt for regional format

THE soccer competitions in Tasmania this year will be based on a regional format, despite representations to Soccer Tasmania by the presidents of all eight of last season's southern-based State League clubs and the president of Metro-Claremont.

The club presidents met late last year and then sent a delegation to meet John Jameson, Soccer Tasmania chairman, and competitions director John McKenna, just before Christmas.

The club presidents wanted the reintroduction of a state league competition, but received no satisfaction from their meeting with the two Soccer Tasmania representatives.

This year, therefore, there will be a Southern Conference League, comprising the eight southern-based State League clubs of last season, together with newcomer Metro-Claremont, and an 11-team Northern Conference League.

Soccer Tasmania's representatives argued any future State League competition would have to be structured on the basis of proportional representation from both the south and north of the state if appropriate sponsorship was to be obtained.

The clubs have now agreed to participate in the nine-team Southern Conference and have signed the relevant licences, although they continue to insist a state league format be adopted in 2001.

The clubs also proposed the re-establishment of an advisory group representing all clubs and which would meet regularly with Soccer Tasmania to voice the ideas of the clubs.

This season's Southern Conference League will consist of University, Glenorchy Knights, Hobart Olympic, Hobart Zebras, Kingborough Lions United, South Hobart, Clarence, New Town Eagles and Metro-Claremont. There will be a bye each week.



2000 saw the return of Eagle old boy George Krambousanos, (formerly with Eagles in the early 80's) at the helm of the senior squad.

The team got off to a flying start, defeating Glenorchy Knights (formerly Croatia) 2-1 in the Summer Cup final, with goals from David Stoddart and Julian Proud. Although not playing at their best, signs were ominous for a good season ahead.

The reserves also took out the Summer Cup when they downed Kingborough Lions United 3-1, with goals by Rodney Bones, Tommy Fotak and Stephen Bukowiecki. Kingborough's goal was an own-goal by Gilbert Steenhuis.

Optimistic George on players' side

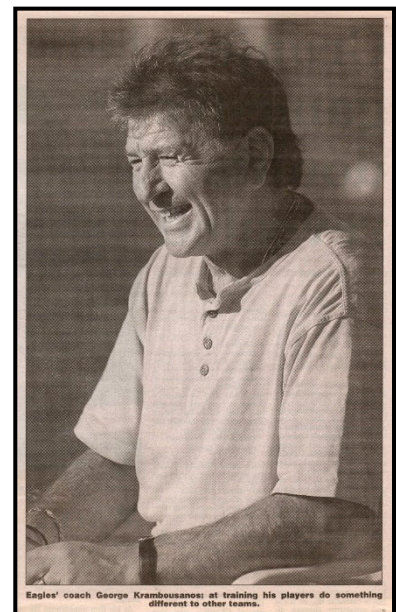

GEORGE Krambousanos always has a smile on his face and approaches his coaching responsibilities with New Town Eagles in an optimistic frame of mind. He has absolute confidence in his players and regards them as mature and responsible adults. "My job finishes on Thursday nights after our final training session of the week, and when I've picked the team," Krambousanos said.

"There is no pep talk before a game and very few words are spoken at that time because if we haven't got it together by the time we play, we'll never do it. "I coach, and they play the game, and it is up to them to prepare themselves, so I don't have to set rules for them."

Training sessions are important, and they must be enjoyable as far as Krambousanos is concerned, so everything is done with the ball. "The beauty of Eagles is the training session," he said. "We do something different to anyone else. "When I took over the team this season, people said I had old players, and that hurt my feelings. "My players love to play with the ball, and they do everything with the ball at training and I think that has given them new life."

Something must be working because Krambousanos's philosophy is bearing fruit. Eagles have already won one trophy this season (the Summer Cup), and last Saturday they collected their first win from two outings by thrashing Metro-Claremont 11-3, a score-line not seen very often in the top-flight.

Eagles have yet to lose under Krambousanos in seven outings, and they have won five of those games. Krambousanos is confident the club can win the Statewide Milan Lakoseljac Memorial Trophy, the first round of which starts over Easter, and he thinks Eagles will do well in the league. "Eagles are playing as well as, if not better, than anyone else," he said.

"Everyone is attending training, I have no favorites, and all the players push themselves. We have depth, and there are young players coming up who are willing to listen and learn. We are all amateurs, and our reward is the satisfaction of winning, but also to have fun and enjoy ourselves."

Krambousanos, who played the game in Tasmania before moving interstate and playing and coaching in Victoria, regards the Glenorchy Knights, Kingborough Lions United, University and Hobart Olympic as Eagles' major challengers, with Eagles and the Knights the two favorites for the league championship.

He has recently completed a coaching course in Sydney and firmly believes that coaches need to be qualified.

He also thinks that every coach would do well to watch a national league team's training session, and he is convinced that local players need to warm up as a team for at least half-an-hour before a game, as visiting interstate sides always do.

Krambousanos had a brief stint as coach of Hobart Olympic a few seasons back before he and the club parted company, but now that he is in charge of Eagles, he is already showing what he is capable of as the supremo of one of the biggest names in Tasmanian soccer.

Eagles' avalanche shatters Metro

METRO-Claremont, top of the Wrest Point League soccer competition at the beginning of the weekend, was brought to earth with a thump yesterday, when it was thrashed 11-3 by New Town Eagles at the latter's Clare St headquarters.

The newcomer to the top-flight, had won its opening match at home last Sunday, but away from home yesterday, it proved no match for the might of a rampant Eagles.

It was 1-1 after a mere five minutes, but the writing was already on the wall for Metro as it trailed 5-2 at the interval. Richard Leszczynski, who played for Metro last year before rejoining his former club, where he had made his name as one of the Tasmania's most feared strikers, notched four goals.

Colin Shepherd, the thinking man's David Beckham of Tasmanian soccer, netted a hat-trick, as did skipper David Stoddart. The talented and under-rated utility player, Mark De Vries, grabbed the remaining goal, while for Metro, Adam Tassell scored twice and fellow striker Steve Pettit once.

The win moved Eagles from fifth to second on the ladder, while Metro dropped to fourth.

Eagles open gap at the top

NEW TOWN Eagles opened up a four-point lead at the top of the Wrest Point League soccer competition, when it thrashed second-last Hobart Zebras 8-2 at KGV Soccer Park last night. Eagles scored four goals in the opening 15 minutes to lead 4-1 at the break.

Darren Frost netted twice, while Luke DeVries, Richard Leszczynski and second-half substitute Matthew Holloway, also scored twice. Sergio Pace and Ivica Bolonja netted for the Zebras. Eagles' victory was tempered by the loss through injury of captain David Stoddart, who pulled a hamstring, while Michael Murray was also injured. "We played some great soccer, and we were all over them," said Eagles' coach George Krambousanos.

"It could have been 13 or 14 goals in reality. We were missing Mark De Vries and suffered two injuries during the game, but Darren Frost deserved his senior start and celebrated with two goals, while Matthew Holloway strengthened his claims for place by coming on at half-time and also scoring a couple of goals."

Richard Leszczynski's two goals last night took his season's league tally to six goals. This makes him the equal leading scorer on six goals with Brendan Lakoseljac, of the Glenorchy Knights. The Hobart Zebras' situation is looking grim as their goal difference is becoming alarming. They have drawn one and lost two of their three outings, and their goal-difference is minus eight.



An injury mid-way through the season to top striker Richard Leszczynski left the side short of fire power for two months, and despite some good results throughout the year they ended the season runners up to the Glenorchy Knights.

Potts making his mark as an Eagles' striker

JOSH Potts has scored four of New Town Eagles' 19 goals in the Premier League soccer competition this season and also netted twice in the Milan Lakoseljic Memorial Trophy state-wide cup competition. That is not a bad effort for the 17-year-old striker, who is in his first season as a regular senior player.

Last season, Potts made several appearances off the bench, but he now regularly partners Richard Leszczynski, one of the state's best strikers, in attack. Eagles are rebuilding after many years at the top and Potts is one of several youngsters in the senior line-up.

A Year 12 student at Guilford Young College, he hopes to go to University next year, but has not yet decided what to study. He began playing soccer as a six-year-old in Canberra. His father, a retired member of the Royal Australian Air Force, brought the family to Hobart four years ago and the younger Potts joined Eagles on the recommendation of a teacher at Sacred Heart School.

"I don't really feel any pressure playing up front with Richard Leszczynski", Potts said. I just try and do the best I can and hopefully that's good enough. "I'm learning a lot from Richard because he's a good player and I respect him."

Potts is also a referee, and on the days he isn't playing for Eagles, he can be found officiating at under-18 games. "I like to referee because it allows me to know the rules of the game better and to earn a bit of money at the same time", Potts said.

"There's no conflict of interest involved, and it has probably taught me to keep my mouth shut as a player. "I don't see refereeing as my future and I just want to keep playing for as long as I can at the highest level."

Potts said he fancied University for the title and that Eagles would be trying very hard to finish in the top five teams. "We lost a lot of players from last season, and it hasn't been a great year for the club," he said.

"We're rebuilding this year and trying to get a bit of experience and get up to strength again. "We've got a great coach in Craig Jones, whom I had in the reserves last year."

"I'm just happy to be playing in the seniors, although I'm at right-wing at the moment whereas I prefer it in the middle."

Potts is sure to feature more prominently in the goal-scoring charts as Eagles try to get their act together during the rest of the season.

The Division 3 side featuring Scott Young, and David Stoddart - on a break from senior duties - also convincingly won the league title, finishing 13 points ahead of second placed University Bombers.

Eagles duo hurt in bike crash

TWO of Tasmania's soccer's most promising players have been seriously injured in a motorcycle accident and are in hospital in Victoria.

New Town Eagles seniors midfielder Darren Frost, 25, and seniors striker Josh Potts, 18, were involved in a motorcycle accident near Nubeena last week and were later flown to a hospital in Melbourne for specialist treatment.

Frost was also in charge of the Eagles' under-23 side and was voted Soccer Tasmania's Under-23 Youth League coach-of-the-year last season, while Potts was also a promising referee.

The accident has cast a pall over the Eagles club, which commenced pre-season training on the day of the accident.

"For a club to lose one player of this calibre is a great loss, but to lose two players of such great skill, commitment and club pride is a disaster," said Eagles president John Large.

"The committee, coaches, players and supporters of this close-knit club have rallied together to get over their initial shock and grief to ensure that all that can be done at this stage is being done.

"Our main interest at this stage is to ensure that all we can do for these players and their families is being done and that both players receive the utmost care and attention.

"Our thoughts, prayers and positive reinforcement go out to them at this time.

"The club will issue updated information as it becomes available to ensure that the soccer community as a whole can unite and assist wherever possible."

Large said both players would probably need to spend a number of weeks in Melbourne.



Despite this setback, Eagles had an excellent start to the season, following on from last season's last round fine performances. The first round yielded seven wins and two losses, putting the team in a strong position to challenge for the title. A poor second round however, put paid to any title aspirations and only two wins, one draw and six losses (including losing the last four games of the season) resulted in a disappointing 5th place finish.

Drafted to lead the attack in the absence of Richard Leszczynski, who was interstate, Burn proved lethal, scoring once five minutes before the interval and twice in the last six minutes of the game.

Olympic, which had more than enough chances to win but was toothless in front of goal, had striker Andre Phillips sent off by referee Owen Laing in the 69th minute after receiving a second yellow card.

Eagles gave a first-class display of counter-attacking and proved deadly in this regard, while Olympic created many useful attacks which were spoiled by poor finishing. The win takes Eagles to within a point of leader South Hobart, which meets Glenorchy Knights at South Hobart today.

Striker rues encounter of red-card kind

NEW Town Eagles' promising young striker Matthew Burn has made six senior appearances in the Premier League soccer competition and scored five goals.

However, his latest senior game ended abruptly on Saturday, when he was sent off early in the second half, after a tangle with an opponent. But Burn was not complaining. "I got gripped around the neck," Burn said. "I try not to retaliate, and as soon as the referee showed me the red card I walked. There's not much you can do about it. I just put my arms up, maybe you can call that retaliation, it's just the way the referee saw it."

Burn had scored Eagles' goal, but it was not enough to prevent his side going down 3-2 to Hobart Olympic. In the previous meeting between the sides at senior level, Burn netted a hat-trick as Eagles triumphed 3-0. With 26 goals, he is the Reserve League's leading scorer, and it is that form that has seen him elevated to the senior line-up on occasion.

He is not perturbed about not being a regular in the seniors as he knows his chance will come. "We've got a pretty strong club, with Michael Fong and Richard Leszczynski up front, so I just try and fit in where and when I can," he said. Rosetta Primary School was his first experience of soccer, and he has played for both the Glenorchy Knights and Eagles at club level.

He has represented Southern Tasmania at youth level but shied away from the Academy of Soccer, despite being earmarked as a precocious talent when he played at under-16 level as a 13-year-old. He was in the Knights reserve side that won the league championship in 2000, but has spent seven years in all at Eagles. His brother Marcus, has also played for Eagles, but is presently with the Knights, and they may well face each other in the Reserve League top-five finals series.

"Marcus plays in defence, and with me in attack, chances are we'll come up against each other if we play the Knights," he said. "It'd be really good, as there's a bit of rivalry between us." Burn is confident the Eagles can go all the way and win the reserve-grade top-five final, having already won the league championship.

Given his scoring prowess, he may, however, be called up for the seniors, who are in the Premier League top-five finals. He may have to sit out the first game if he cops a suspension for Saturday's send-off. But that should make him even more keen to play to his ability when he returns and score the all-important goals in the finals series, which could make up for Eagles' disappointing league campaign this year.

Injured Eagles soar again

THEY are two of Hobart's bravest and most inspirational young men. Darren Frost and Josh Potts have fought back from horrific injuries that could have claimed their lives in a motorcycle accident.

Now the two good mates and former soccer stars are destined to spend their lives in wheelchairs, sidelined from the sport they love. But the inner strength and determination that propelled them to the top of the sporting ladder is being turned towards getting on with their lives.

Darren, 26, is returning to work today, as a customer service officer with his former employer, Erico Lightning Technologies. Josh, 18, plans to resume his studies and start a university course next year. And despite the continuing pain, the endless medical treatments and the loss of control of their bodies from the chest down, the pair are determined to remain positive and focused.

"I've got no complaints," Darren said. "I'm alive. That's a bonus." The pair were both talented senior players for the New Town Eagles soccer club, Darren a midfielder and Josh a striker. Darren also coached the Eagles' under-23 side and had been named the state's youth league coach of the year, while Josh was showing his talents as a referee.

About 11pm on January 8, in a moment of youthful exuberance, they jumped on to Darren's motorcycle and headed down the road from their friend's shack at White Beach, where they were staying. They don't remember what happened next, or even who was riding the motorcycle when it left the road and slammed into a tree.

Darren and Josh, who were not wearing helmets, received horrific injuries and were lying unconscious by the roadside until a friend came looking for them. An ambulance was called, and they were later flown to the Austin Hospital in Melbourne, where the full extent of their injuries became clear.

Darren's head was split open, his left eye and ear were damaged, he chipped most of his teeth, suffered a broken sternum, collarbone, shoulder-blade and five ribs, plus punctured his lungs. He also broke his back and severed his spinal cord. Josh received horrific head injuries, which required three metal plates to repair his skull. He broke both cheekbones, his left shoulder-blade and every rib on his left side. His lungs were also punctured.

Josh also broke his back in two places. With their families keeping vigil, the pair lay unconscious in hospital for several weeks, with tubes inserted through their throats to help them breathe. They fought for their lives and eventually they won, returning to Tasmania in July for continued therapy.

Neither suffered significant brain damage. They have kept their handsome looks and their bright personalities. "There's so many more things than just having the use of our legs," Josh said. "Not being able to use our legs isn't the worst of it. "I have my moments when I get depressed and it's like I was planning where my life would go and now I can't go there anymore."

"It's hugely frustrating sometimes. "I don't think I realise yet that this is forever." Josh lives at Lenah Valley with his parents, Chris and Lee, and has set his sights on replacing his manual car and learning to drive an automatic equipped for people who cannot use their legs to drive.

Darren continues to live with his mum, Sue, and her fiancé, Graydon Peppiatt, at Old Beach and is looking forward to starting work today. A former storeman, he will try out a new role in customer service.

"It's just one of those things that happened," Darren said, trying to explain his continued cheerful outlook on life. "I am grateful that I have the use of my hands. The club have been really good to us. The team members came to Melbourne when we were there."

All three Eagles sides have made the play-offs, and Darren and Josh will be on the sidelines when the finals begin on Friday night.

Eagles keeper building his reputation

ALLAN Wisby has saved four of the penalties he has faced this soccer season. The 30-year-old New Town Eagles goalkeeper's performance, conjures up visions of Spain's Iker Casillas, who saved three Irish penalties at the World Cup on Monday. Saving penalties is no mean feat, as the advantage is all with the kicker, the goalkeeper not being expected to save.



Wisby is back as the Eagles' senior goalkeeper after missing the past couple of seasons teaching in the UK. He is currently teaching children with disabilities at Kingston High School and puts his elevation to senior status at Eagles down to the fact he completed a good pre-season training regime.

"I was hesitant at first because the club has very good young goalkeepers in Andrew Savage and Sam Kruijver, who could fill the senior spots at any team," Wisby said.

"I think I got the nod because Andrew and Sam weren't able to train regularly through the pre-season because of various other commitments. "I felt a bit uncomfortable in games early on, but I'm getting my confidence back now. "The good thing about the club is that everyone is happy, regardless of whether we're winning or losing."

Wisby believes second-placed Eagles played quite well with only nine men against league-leader South Hobart on Saturday, despite going down 3-1. "I think we could have won," he said. "I think we're still looking pretty good, and the title is not out

of reach, and South Hobart won't go through undefeated." Wisby played as a youth with Metro-Claremont and Juventus, before moving on to Caledonians, and then having three years at Nelson.

Danny Donohue encouraged him and Zlatko Belanic, who is now back in Adelaide, provided him with specialist goalkeeping coaching. Wisby is confident that Eagles has recovered from its lean period in recent seasons and is set for a great future.

"The depth we have at the club is fantastic," he said. "We'll be okay for the next five to 10 years. "Every club goes through lean periods, but I'm confident about the future because we have fantastic players coming through."

Wisby, who is on the club committee, is quieter on the field than many goalkeepers. "I'll tell my defenders what to do if something needs to be said, but I won't keep talking all the time," he said.

What coach Dale Itchins had to say about 2003:

"The season has been a long and tough one for our women's team, having played five Summer Cup and nineteen roster matches. This left a total of thirteen players, which was a bare minimum to operate with during the year.

Our improvement was noted by all opposition teams, and the main keys were an outstanding year by Leesa Collett in goals and our ability to double our scoring from the previous year finishing with 53 goals as opposed to 29 in 2002. The average age of the squad is 16, and I believe their general fitness and the girls natural skill and ability contributed to their outstanding improvement on last season. The challenge for the club is to maintain and keep all squad members for the future, and to also campaign for a 2nd team in the Division 1 competition. This will release pressure when numbers are down and provide an incentive for all players at the club to play in the Premier squad. Hopefully we have set up a great platform for the squad, and Corey and I would like to congratulate the girls on their tremendous season, and wish the club and players success for the future. May they achieve much more in their careers."

Zero tolerance for abusive language

TASMANIA'S soccer referees are to adopt a zero-tolerance policy towards foul and abusive language from players and spectators right from the start of the coming season.

The policy will be in force when the southern Summer Cup begins on March 6 and was applied at Sunday's opening round of the northern pre-season Steve Hudson Cup series.

Association Football's Law 12 deals with fouls and misconduct and the punishment for the use of offensive, insulting or abusive language and/or gestures is a send-off.

"The directive is clear to all referees and their assistants and is effective immediately," said Stephen McEwan, the State referees' coach.

"This will not be a popular directive for players and club officials and I would expect to see a few red cards in the early part of the season.

"In the long term, however, referees will feel safe from abuse by players and club officials and this will assist us in retaining referees and could help bring more families back to the game and into the grounds."



In 2004 Mark Leszczynski returned as senior coach after eight years out of the coaching game. Although anchored by a solid central defensive pairing of veteran Scott Young and an emerging Chris Wass, the team once again struggled with consistency, and found themselves in the bottom half of the table by season's end.

A poor first round included only 1 win against lowly Metro Claremont and that occurred in the last game. A stronger second round saw the team lose only one game, and that was against the subsequent premiers. The highlight of the second round was a win against title chasing University, which ultimately contributed to them losing the title.

Finishing in eighth position was disappointing and could have been substantially better, if Eagle had been able to convert a number of their seven drawn games, the highest in the competition, into wins. Their lack of goalscoring power was a big issue, and its goal tally of 16 was the Club's lowest since 1964.

Scott Young was voted the Best and Fairest player for the season, 20 years after winning his first award in 1984.

Lowly Eagles shock Uni with 3-2 victory

He makes up for his lack of height with extreme agility and bravery, but at 16 he is still growing. He conceded, and then saved a penalty in Sunday's 1-0 loss to South Hobart in the Milan Lakoseljac Memorial Trophy State-wide competition, but Eagles had won their previous three games. "I think we can crack the top-five," Pitchford said. "The social life at the club is back and spirits are high, and everyone is in a good frame of mind." Pitchford is in Year 11 at Guilford Young and is pursuing health studies, English communication and physical science with a view to studying human movement or sports management at tertiary level.

He also is interested in a professional soccer career and already has been to Sydney and Melbourne. "In Sydney, I had a session with former Australian goalkeeper Jim Fraser, while in Melbourne I trained with Sunshine George Cross," he said. "I'll be going to Melbourne again in November for a trial with George Cross, but I'd really like to go to England at some time."

In the meantime, Pitchford is helping out as a goalkeeping coach with the state under-15s and the Southern Tasmanian under-13s as he is too old for the under-16 squad. He is hoping there are further developments with the state under-19s, whose last outing was against the Victorian Institute of Sport in March this year.

Agility and technique are the most important attributes a goalkeeper needs, according to Pitchford. He demonstrates both in abundance as he strives to help Eagles climb further up the league ladder.

Parker an exciting and attacking forward and midfielder in his playing days, adopted a very defensive approach to games that produced very few goals, 22 in 18 games, and little excitement, which was a disappointment for the club's supporters, who had been brought up on a diet of exciting, attacking, play.

What coach Ian Parker had to say about 2006:

What coach Andrew Law had to say about 2007:

"After the Summer Cup I took over from Craig Jones as coach of the team, as Craig moved to Melbourne. Throughout the season the girls played well. We had some highs as well as some lows. Our high was beating Nelson 3-2 in a roster game, and our low was losing 3-2 to Clarence in the State-wide Cup semi-final.

Throughout the season, we brought in some new players from the u16 team. Caitlyn Nichols, Chloe Donoghue, Erin Lee and Aimee Datlen filled in for players who had other commitments, and weren't able to play, and they acquitted themselves well. During the season attendance at training was low, and this showed in the second half of most games, as fitness levels started to wane.

As captain of the team, Kathryn McLeod showed great leadership, by putting in 100% each game. Ashley Roberts was always solid in the back line, and Lauren Farquhar playing in the middle, helped the back line out by stopping attacks coming forward, as well as helping the forward line out by scoring a few goals. In 2008 relegation was brought into the Premier League to replace the play-off regime that had existed in 2006 and 2007, whereby the team finishing last in the Premier League faced a play-off match against the team that won the Division 1, title to determine the final makeup of the league in the following season.

FFT's stance was that it wanted to strengthen the competition by reducing the number of teams able to compete in it, but given the myriad of different relegation / promotion scenarios (and number of teams participating) that had played out since 2000, looking at it from an outside perspective, it seemed that decisions were being made by those in the FFT hierarchy that either had a vested interest in some of the club's themselves or were being influenced by others who did.

Going from a play-off scenario for the last placed team, to the two bottom teams being immediately relegated, and the third last team facing a play-off, was a significant change when you consider what had previously occurred, when high profile teams such as South Hobart and Olympia had escaped relegation in previous seasons because it was deemed that relegation and promotion was not necessary for the competition.

The South Hobart one in 2000 was totally baffling, as the league was expanded to a 10-team competition by bringing in a DOSA team that had finished 5th in Division 1, hardly a competition strengthening strategy as their subsequent results showed.

Given Eagle's performances in the previous few years, the season was always going to be a topsy turvy ride for both the players and supporters alike. To add to the pressure, Eagle's would be without coach Ian Parker during the season, as he would be overseas for eight weeks. In his absence the team would be coached by Stephen Pitchford.

Time in charge runs out for Eagles' innovator

NEW Town Eagles' assistant coach Stephen Pitchford will hand the reins of the senior team back to Ian Parker next weekend. Pitchford has been in charge for five games while Parker has been in England. In that time, Eagles won once, 2-1 away against Metro and lost four times. They are eighth on the ladder.

The team had two points when Parker went overseas and now has five, but the battle to avoid relegation is well and truly on. The bottom two sides, currently Metro and Taroona, are automatically relegated, while the third-last faces a playoff against the Division One champion.

Pitchford has been innovative during his time in charge and has adopted an unorthodox 2-6-2 formation. "We have played a 2-6-2 for the past three games," Pitchford said. "I simply dispensed with a sweeper to allow us more players in midfield and to allow us to be in possession for longer periods and to restrict opposition freedom through the middle of the ground.

"It has worked to the extent that we have certainly had more possession, and have attacked opponents more freely than earlier in the season, but we have not yet converted that success into points, which is what we need." Pitchford is well aware of what is required to avoid relegation.

"The key to avoiding the bottom three places is scoring goals," he said. "With only four goals in eight games, we have been struggling, but the recent increase in shots, and shots on target, is encouraging and we believe that wins over Clarence, Kingborough and Taroona in the first three matches of the second round will be important." Pitchford has enjoyed his time in charge of the senior side. "It has been a challenging period," he said. "We lost Jayden Wiggins and Scott Telega before I started, and Amadu Koroma overseas, as well as Matthew Rybak to long-term injury."

"This has meant blending in players from the reserves and, at the same time, changing to playing attacking soccer. The way all players have accepted the challenges has been terrific. The first high, I suppose, was the first win of the season over Metro.

"The second high was the way in which the players embraced the change to a 2-6-2 formation against South Hobart, while the third high was the way in which the team fought back against University and played attacking soccer for 90 minutes.

"The low was losing to a last-minute, against-the-run-of-play goal to University. Also, the goals that are conceded to basic errors or loss of concentration.

When Ian returns, my advice to him will be that we should continue to consider the attacking formation where the opposition appears to be susceptible to its strengths."

The proof of the pudding will be on Friday night, when Eagles take on reigning champions Hobart Zebras at KGV Park.

It was 4-2 in the 68th minute when a cross from Cairns hit Lapolla's knee and the ball looped over Land and into the net.

Eagles were much too good against an Olympic side that was woeful in defence and which had eight players cautioned and coach Farrell Shaw sent behind the fence by referee Dirk Gadd.

The energetic and enthusiastic young Eagles side, led 4-0 at the interval through goals by Nick Ferrall, Adam McKeown, Jamie Vernon and Wade Savage.

Vernon, McKeown and Savage then each scored again, as Eagles raced to a 7-0 lead with just 15 minutes remaining.

Adam Hedge headed Olympic's consolation goal from Chris Tsakiris's free-kick in the last minute.

South ready to seal title Morton's outfit a strong favourite

SOUTH Hobart can win the Premier League soccer title for the first time since 2002 by either beating or drawing with second-last and relegated Metro at home at South Hobart tomorrow.

Hobart Olympic is assured of third place - win, lose or draw - against fourth-placed Glenorchy Knights at KGV Park tonight. Knights could lose fourth spot and this incentive may be enough to spur them to victory against an Olympic side that submitted meekly to Eagles last weekend.

Eagles owe much to SOS keeper

MICHAEL Soszynski is one of the reasons for New Town Eagles' present run of success in the Premier League soccer competition. The goalkeeper answered an SOS from coach George Krambousanos, who had just one goalkeeper for the senior team, Craig Minty, 17. Nathan Pitchford and his understudy Andrew Savage, have both been sidelined for the season with leg injuries.

Soszynski, 27, had played for Krambousanos before. He began his Tasmanian career with Eagles before moving on to Taroona, Hobart Olympic, South Hobart (with which he won the Premier League title in 2002) Beachside and Hobart United. He spent 2006 with Adelaide Polonia in the SA Premier League, after returning from Europe, where he was with Leigh RMI, Altrincham FC, and Droylsden FC. "These clubs were all in the English Conference League," said Soszynski.

"I was also the train-on keeper with Chester City and Bury in League Two, and Stockport County in League One. I also trialed with Legia Warszawa and Crakovia in Poland."

Of his return from retirement, he said: "It was initially only going to be for a period of six to eight weeks, but it has since been determined that Nathan Pitchford is now going to have to sit out the remainder of the season."

Soszynski has played in six of the Eagles' eight games since joining the club this season. They are sixth on the ladder and performing well. They are well clear of the relegation zone and could end up among the leading four sides, thanks in no small part to their keeper.



What coach George Krambousanos had to say about 2009:

"Well, it all started back in the year 2000, when I last coached the club; we won the summer cup and finished second to Glenorchy Knights. For no particular reason, I decided to step down from the coaching position. It was the biggest mistake that I have made in my coaching career. Branded "the coach that keeps moving from club to club" (for personal reasons), I found myself not wanted; not because of my coaching ability, but more because I wouldn't stay in one place for more than a year or two.

From year 2001-2008, I attended as many New Town Eagle games as I could. I decided that I had unfinished business with the club and would apply for the job in 2009 if available. And the rest goes like this...

We had a great pre-season attendance between 30-45 players, assisted by the reserve coach Rodney Bones, and u19 coach Kevin Clamp.

The start of the season, the Summer Cup, gave us an idea of what we were up against for the rest of the 2009 league. Our group included South Hobart, Tilford Zebras and Hobart Olympic. These three teams finished first, second and third in 2008. First game we lost to South Hobart 6-nil. Second game we won 1-nil against Hobart Olympic. Third game we lost 6-nil to Tilford Zebras.

Never have I, as a coach, been beaten with such scores. This competition gave me an insight into areas that we had to work on to be competitive for the year 2009, these being attitude, discipline, team bonding and the ability to believe in ourselves. After the Summer Cup we had three weeks to bring it all together before the league season started.

During these three weeks we lost our number one keeper, Nathan Pitchford, in a practice game against Launceston City. Our first league game we played against Glenorchy Knights and lost 4-3. We started the game with three of our strongest players on the bench for personal reasons. They all started in the second half and turned the game around.

In the second game we played Kingborough Lions and lost 6-3. In this game we lost our second goalkeeper, Andrew Savage, when he snapped his achilles tendon. At that moment, the score was 2-1 to Kingborough Lions. Young Craig Minty, came on after playing in the reserves. Everyone realised that he was very nervous, as he unexpectedly required to on to the field, and although the final score was 6-3, he made some great saves and showed his potential.

After these two games we started to become a team, and the lads started to believe in themselves. After speaking to my co-captains, Christopher Wass, Nathan Pitchford and my manager Peter Wass, I rang to enquire about a third keeper, Michael Soszynski. They all agreed to the approach, so I rang him. This is how the conversation went:

GK: Hi Michael, How are you going?

MS: I was waiting for your phone call.

GK & MS: Have a laugh.

GK: Would you like to put the gloves on and keep for New Town Eagles.

MS: I can only play 5 games.

Not only did he play 5 games but, he also played for the rest of the season as well as trained the other keepers throughout the season. My coaching staff and I would like to say a very special thank you to Michael and hope that he can continue coaching our keepers next year as he did a fantastic job.

The first round we finished with 9 points, our positive results were as follows: Hobart Olympic (1-0), Clarence United (1-0) and University (3-0).

The second round was not so good. Although we had a very positive win against Kingborough Lions (4-1) and a good draw against Tilford Zebras (3-3), these were the only games we accumulated points.

The third round was the one that had all the other clubs talking. We lost one game to Tilford Zebras. We drew against Glenorchy Knights (1-1), Clarence United (2-2), Hobart Olympic (1-1) and South Hobart (2-2). We Won against Kingborough Lions (5-2) and University (2-0). This gave us 10 points for the round, a total of 24 points, which was only 2 points below the top 4 in the league. It was the first time in many years that the Eagle have scored so many goals!

There were some challenges however... During the year we had four players at University in Launceston, Cormac Collins, Alex Leszczynski, Nathan Pitchford and Shane Kent as well as Alex Gordon working up there. Although these players attended training sessions with clubs in Launceston, it still made it hard for us to work as a team.

I am happy with the team effort for 2009, but we have higher aims for the 2010 season."

Malakoff one of rising young guns at Eagles

Last Friday evening, when New Town Eagles found themselves 2-0 down against Glenorchy Knights after just 38 minutes, Eagles coach George Krambousanos knew it was time to call on the cavalry.

One of the three substitutions he made in and around half-time, to try and pull the game out of the fire, was 16-year-old midfielder Jacob Malakoff.

Malakoff settled into his midfield role like a veteran and helped his side get back into the game. Eagles performed admirably in the second half, and just lost by the odd goal at the end 4-3. Malakoff, a Year 11 student at The Friends School, was a southern representative at 14 and decided to join Eagles at that time, when he was in Year 9.

He played reserves for a season and a half, but is now a regular member of Eagles' senior side. "I think I'm going well, although it was a bit disappointing not to start on Friday," Malakoff said. "I think we'll go better in our next game." Malakoff made his senior debut as a 15-year-old in 2007, when he came on as a substitute for 5 minutes, but he became a regular early last season. He used to play as a right-winger and then as a defensive midfielder, but is now generally used in a central midfield role.

"I thought we were worth at least a draw against Knights," Malakoff said. "We just let in a couple of sloppy goals, and we'll have to work on that. "We need to get a good start this season and get as far away from the bottom as we can. "If we can do that, then maybe we should try and make the top-four. "I think we should try and get the spot behind Zebras and South Hobart, if possible. "It's an important year because of automatic relegation for the bottom team, so first of all, we need to get away from University and Kingborough, the sides that will probably battle things out with us."

Krambousanos believes Malakoff has huge potential, given his self-discipline, attitude, willingness to attend training, skills and awareness on the field. He needs to be a little more of an extrovert on the pitch and put on some weight," Krambousanos said. "I rate him as a player who is going to be very good and he's a delight to coach."

Eagles striker shoots for golden boot

ADAM McKeown is fast becoming one of the Southern Premier League's most lethal strikers.

The target man is in his third year at senior level for New Town Eagles, but early season signs indicate this could be his most prolific.

The quick-footed forward, who is the pinnacle of Eagles' attacks, has netted eight goals in nine league matches and added a cup double to his account against Nelson Eastern Suburbs in the first round of the Milan Lakoselj Memorial Trophy on Saturday.

McKeown is now only two goals shy of his 2009 season total, sits third on the goal scorers chart and is responsible for exactly half of his team's league goals.

"I think it could definitely be my best season yet. I've been fairly happy with the start, but while I've scored a few I've also been frustrated by a number of misses," McKeown said.

McKeown trails the more established frontrunners - Hobart Zebras' Ben Crosswell and South Hobart's Jonathan Lo by one goal, but the striker is optimistic he can keep in touch in the race for the league's golden boot.

"They [Crosswell and Lo] are both pretty outstanding players, but hopefully I can match them goal for goal."

But McKeown maintains his main aim is not centred on individual performance but on his team's success.

"The main thing is I want to make sure the team goes well before anything individual; individual achievements are just a bonus." A wise commitment from the 20-year-old - the Eagles have finished in the bottom three for three seasons running and currently sit in a familiar position in the bottom half of the table.

But McKeown believes the tide has turned for the Eagles and the side can finish in the top four this season to qualify for the Statewide Finals Series. The Eagles' hopes of finishing fourth may rest on McKeown's scoring exploits.

2010 saw the passing of the influential Don Finegan, who was lured out of “retirement” in the mid-70’s by Eagle, to help overhaul the club’s playing list, and he was an integral part of a very successful period in the club’s history.

Vale Don Finegan

Dominic (Don) Finegan, a mover and shaker in local football circles from the 1950s to the 1970s, passed away in Hobart last Friday at the age of 80.

Don, as he was known, played with South Hobart in the same era as Bert Hudson. He was later to become a leading referee and an administrator with two of the big clubs of the time, Olympia and White Eagles.

Don was a top referee in the 1960s and, after retiring from that facet of the game, became chairman of Olympia in the late 1960s and early 1970s. He also coached Olympia’s reserves during his time as chairman of the club.

He then moved to White Eagles for a number of years and served on their committee while also coaching some of their junior sides.

Don’s son-in-law, Denis Laing, was a referee at the top level in Hobart during the 80s and 90s, while grandson Owen Laing played for Calies and White Eagles and also turned his hand to refereeing at the same time.
